You will have heard the Prime Minister's call to 'Build Back Better' many times – a 'big-picture' vision for Britain's post COVID world that, given the struggles we have all faced recently, can seem too big and abstract to imagine. But, as with many of Boris Johnson's big ideas, it will happen.

Over the coming months, I would like to explore and explain what this could mean for Hampshire, North East Hampshire as a constituency, and Cliddesden, Ellisfield and Farleigh Wallop, starting with the environment.

We have all seen nature boom throughout our time in restrictions. At the start of the pandemic, newspapers and social media were full of images and clips of animals 'taking back control' of areas man has overused for generations. Venice waterways filled with fish and dolphins, previously well-trodden country paths bursting with wildflower and bugs – locally, I have noticed the bird song much more prevalently as we bound into spring. I don't think anybody could doubt that our connection with nature has been key to us being able to stomach restrictions put in place to protect us. Nature was given a chance to recover, and it did – we must now protect its recovery and include it in our thinking as we grow. Locally in Cliddesden, Ellisfield and Farleigh Wallop, this means the Council must continue to take it into account – not just for nature itself, but for our wellbeing too.

I have written many times on the regeneration of our retail centres, and I know it is an issue residents in Cliddesden, Ellisfield and Farleigh Wallop care about. COVID has given us an opportunity to reflect on what our towns and retail centres mean to us and to rethink our relationship with the buildings that bring our area down. We have some fantastic independent stores, pubs and restaurants in our local towns – these should be supported by increased footfall with attractive community and leisure facilities; and the concrete carbuncles of old replaced with new but in-keeping, traditionally-designed, architectural masterpieces for new shops and cafés too. Having previously been a Borough Councillor – when, as Deputy Leader, I led regeneration in Basingstoke – I know our local Council is fully equipped and able to bring these changes about.

'Build Back Better' is more than a slogan, it the groundwork of a plan across the country and here in North East Hampshire to still look and feel like home – whilst allowing it to mature and modernise.

Walking with Wildlife


The curious tale of the missing house martins was resolved with the warmer weather at the end of May. A flock of ten or so martins finally returned to their summer haunts here at Newhouse Farm, whizzing around the barns in the bright morning sunshine. In 25 years of recording, this was their latest arrival, some five weeks beyond previous years. I presume the chilly April followed by a soggy May affected the flying insects on which they feed. Now the martins are back, as if from quarantine, floating overhead with their familiar flutter and glide.

The warmth of the late May holiday weekend held the promise of butterflies and a timely visit to the Noar Hill nature reserve, near Selborne. With 'no mow in May', the verges along the lanes were white with a wash of cow parsley. The hedges were a mass of blossom, mainly hawthorn with its perplexing scents. Fluffy seeds of pussy willow drifted around on the breeze. The whitebeams - chalkland specialists - were leafing up, silvery-green.

Following a meandering route through the reserve, we first entered a sheltered hollow. Treading carefully, we found small blue butterflies busily searching the sunlit floor. Small blues are engagingly petite and easily overlooked. Heading on, we roamed the cowslip lawns, now turning to seed. Our botanical ramble also revealed blue specks of milkwort sprinkling the turf, plus fine specimens of early purple orchids, still present. It was the turn now for common twayblades to set the scene: these sturdy orchids have a single pair of broad oval leaves from which arises a tall flower spike. The flowers resemble little green people.

The Noar Hill reserve is well known for its colony of Duke of Burgundy butterflies. Finding them though can be rather a challenge. Resembling a small fritillary, they are often tucked away and quite elusive. On this occasion remarkably, both the timing and the conditions were ideal. Instead of one or two specimens, we were pleased to meet eleven or twelve of these delightful rarities.



On the Farm— Ben Robinson

We cracked on with some haymaking during the hot weather recently.

Initially I thought crop was looking a little light. The sheep had only come off at the end of February and the cold spring did not encourage much growth. However the key with hay is the weather window, 5-6 days of hot sun is needed, preferably with a little breeze. You do not want to miss a spell of haymaking weather! It is always a challenge to get it right, especially as weather forecasts can be so unreliable beyond three days out.

Hay made in mid-June (or earlier) is harder to 'make' than crops cut later in the Summer as there is more water in the grass initially. This means more drying is required. Haymaking is quite a laborious process - mowing, tedding several times, raking, baling, carting and finally stacking over nearly a whole week. My hay fever makes it a greater challenge still! Silaging into clamps by contrast is much quicker and can usually be completed over two days.

Mowing, tedding and raking all went smoothly. The bombshell was dropped when the large square baler I had booked about a week before told me he could no longer make it until the Wednesday. With thunderstorms due on Tuesday night, Wednesday wasn't really an option! I made a few calls to other baler operators in the area but understandably all were booked up before the weather was due to break. There was one possibility left...the small baler.

We usually make a couple of hundred small bales of hay or straw a year at most. Generally small bales are to be avoided- they are a lot of work, and the baling process is quite slow. They are called 'idiot bricks' in the trade with good reason. They largely go into the equine and smallholder market. Most winters I intend to sell the small baler to free up some space in the shed, but I have never quite got round to it yet. Luckily I still had it as it did us proud. Aside from the odd easily rectified blockage the 40 year old veteran kept chewing through the grass, filling the sledge towed behind that was placing the bales into eights for the JCB to load onto the waiting trailers.

With impeccable timing the rain started falling as the last fully loaded trailer left the field. At the time of writing it hasn't stopped since!

Wear appropriate clothing (a long-sleeve shirt and trousers tucked into your socks);

^{DEE}Use an insect repellent;

Wear light coloured fabrics that may help you spot a tick on your clothes; Inspect your skin for ticks, particularly at the end of the day, including your head, neck and skin folds (armpits, groin and waistband)

Check your children's head and neck areas, including their scalp (skin on top of their head)

⁶⁸⁵Check that pets do not bring ticks into your home in their fur.

If you do get bitten by a tick, removing it quickly and correctly can help to reduce any potential risk. The only safe way to remove a tick is to use a pair of fine-tipped tweezers, or an easy-to-use device which can be purchased from pharmacies or vets.

Then:

Grasp the tick as close to the skin as possible. Pull upwards slowly and firmly, as mouthparts left in the skin can cause a local infection

Once removed, apply antiseptic to the bite area and keep an eye on it for several weeks for any changes

Be tick aware!

Watch out there are ticks about! It's the perfect conditions for these mini beasts.

Here's a helpful reminder of some simple 'tick tips' if you're out walking. These tiny insects, which can transmit bacteria such as Lyme disease, can be found throughout the year but are most active between spring and autumn. 



Can you get divorced whilst living in the same house?

Our Family Law team are often asked "can you get divorced whilst living in the same house?" The answer is 'yes,' you can, however as you can imagine, living under the same roof during separation or divorce is not ideal and is by no means an easy thing to

do. This is invariably an emotional and stressful time, even more so if the costs rise because you have not received the correct advice.

If you want to rely on a period of separation to support an application for divorce, you will need to show that you are maintaining separate lives, despite living under the same roof. To comply with this, you must no longer share day-to-day activities such as sharing a bedroom, joint food shopping and eating meals together.

You cannot use grounds of adultery as a reason to divorce if you have continued living in the same property for six months or more after you learned of the adultery, unless that physical relationship is continuing.

You may want to consider making a separation agreement if you cannot yet or do not want to apply for a divorce but want to make it clear when your relationship ended. Although not a legally binding court order, a separation agreement can give the court a clear indication of how you wish to deal with financial assets.

If you live in the same property but separate as an unmarried couple, you may both want to consider a 'Deed of Separation.' This can cover ongoing maintenance, especially if you have children, and what will happen if you were to sell your home, setting out how the money from this will be divided too.



Summary

May was largely unsettled, with rain on all but two days in the first $3\frac{1}{2}$ weeks, in stark contrast to the preceding month which had rain on just one day. There were sunny spells and showers or longer outbreaks of rain and low pressure systems brought continuous rain and a fresh, gusting to strong breeze on the evening of the 3^{rd} with similar wet and windy conditions on the 8^{th} and around the early part of the third week. Firstly, it was an absolute pleasure to bring our energetic new Police & Crime Commissioner - Donna Jones to the constituency for a special **BEAT** surgery with local police officers.

We spent a busy evening outside East Stratton Village Hall where any policing matters could be raised by residents. Illegal trap racing along the A33 was a key topic and our PCC went away with a clear message that we expect a comprehensive plan in place for any future events. And we are both clear, people from outside our area will

not come here to use our roads as a race-track.

Thank you to local councillors who joined us for what I hope will become a more regular event. Visible policing is more important than ever in our rural community.

Secondly, I am reportedly a "rebel" again after backing our own 0.7% official development assistance target. That is, for those who don't know, the policy whereby the U.K. spends 0.7% of gross national income on overseas aid.

It remains something I am incredibly proud of and, while I totally accept not everyone agrees with the concept of even having an aid budget, I have seen first-hand the amazing work this country is able to support on behalf of some of the poorest people on earth.

The current argument is whether we should make savings from this budget, and drop from 0.7-0.5, for a period while we recover from the worst effects of the pandemic. My judgment is we should not but, if we do, we have to set a clear date for its return. Every other G7 country is maintaining its commitment and while the saving (some £4bn) is a lot of money, it means a lot more to the places it goes to help than it does to our relatively rich nation.

As I always say to those who disagree with me on this subject; charity does begin at home; it just does not end there.

Finally, my 2020-21 Annual Report is out now and being delivered to homes right across the Itchen Valley. I produce this each spring to fulfil the promise I made to my constituents when I was elected eleven years ago.

Look out for your copy to see how we've adapted in a time of Covid to ensure constituents can continue to engage with me (and even see inside the voting lobbies of the House of Commons). There's a specific Westminster Report covering, among other things, my work on the influential DCMS Select Committee and with the exciting HIV Commission and you can enter my ballot for tickets to see Prime Ministers' Questions live. 

Lesley Rose, Advice Services Manager for Citizens Advice Winchester District gives advice on what house repairs your landlord is responsible for in a rented property.

I've been living in my privately rented flat for years. I generally have a good relationship with my landlord but I just can't get them to carry out various repairs that have built up.

How can I get them to act - and what exactly do they have to do?

This must be a very frustrating situation. The law states that your landlord must provide accommodation that is safe, healthy and free from things that could cause serious harm. (This is for England - housing is devolved in Wales.)

You don't say exactly what repairs are needed. If you have problems such as electrical wiring that you think might be faulty, or there's damp, or an infestation by pests, the landlord has a legal obligation to put things right.

Landlords are also responsible for the maintenance of the general structure, and fittings such as boilers and radiators; basins, baths and toilets; and the drains.

The first step is to contact your landlord again, in writing. Include photographs of the problems. Keep a record of all communications and evidence relating to the disrepair.

If that doesn't prompt any action, our advisors at Citizens Advice can help with next steps. These could include contacting your local council (who will have dedicated officers for dealing with disrepair in private rented properties) or asking for a visit by the environmental health team.

Tenants can take their landlords to court to force them to carry out repairs. However, it's worth getting some advice and thinking carefully before embarking on this route.
