Dear Friends

My final "DF": Over the years David and I have tried to make you think, to present the good news that there is a God who loves us: who has made Himself known in Jesus Christ, whose life, miracles, ministry, healings, teaching, death on the cross for all our sins, and subsequent bodily resurrection in a transformed body fitted for eternity opens up forgiveness for us: Who returned to His Father and one day is coming again in all His glory to judge the world, and to take to Himself all who have received Him as Saviour and Lord, but who will also destroy all who have rebelled against Him and His ways. (yep, gospel in one really long sentence!)

My own conversion – turning to Christ, being born anew, coming to faith – all these phrases used to describe the moment when we put our personal trust in Jesus Christ – took place on 14 February 1971, during a hymn not in our hymnbooks here: "Who is on the Lord's Side, who will serve the King? Who will be his helpers, other lives to bring?"; since then I have tried to do just that – serve the King, and help others to realise their need of a relationship with Jesus Christ, so that they find the joy and hope of knowing God personally, having assurance of forgiveness and eternal life, and walking with Him daily.

God has not changed; His Word cannot be changed, and what He says applies to every human being – we are all equally loved by Him, invited into relationship with Him, and as we do so, we leave behind our sins, - actions, thoughts, and words - and demonstrate by the new way we live that Jesus Christ is living in us.

We live in a culture which is hell-bent on destroying the very basis on which it was built – on godly Christian virtues, truth and common sense – and where extremists appear to have taken over mainstream media, presenting only one point of view and treating with contempt any view which is contrary. The re-writing of history through warped and delusional worldviews and imposing a new tyranny, which seems to be led by mob rule through social media is an interesting moment in world history where <u>The</u> Truth – not "my" truth and "your" truth - is the biggest casualty – whether over marriage, biology of the human body, education, or a proper understanding of world faiths and politics.

Is this a cause for worry? Repeatedly Jesus said, "Do not worry, do not be afraid, do not fear." Jesus warned that in the last days these things would happen: "love of many good men shall wax cold", persecution of those who follow Christ would arise – as it is doing in many nations across the world.

1 Timothy speaks of many who will depart from the faith giving heed to lies, hypocrisy, and other things – we don't have to go far in the House of Bishops of the Church of England to find those who do not tell or have rejected the truth (I have personal examples so I am not speaking from theory) and propound heresy and a rejection of basic Christian truth. But Jesus will build His Church – working through those who DO walk in His ways. These are wonderful times to be a Christian, because in an increasingly dark world the light of Christ in us shines even more brightly. Are you in His kingdom yet? Have you invited Him into your life and are you daily being filled with His Holy Spirit? Too many people settle for less – and some cases FAR less- than the best – why be a spiritual pauper when we are invited to be

Walking with Wildlife, Robert Bryant

On a morning of rare August sunshine we seize the opportunity to visit Old Winchester Hill, the National Nature Reserve near West Meon. The lure of the chalkhill slopes with their fine flowery meads and promise of butterflies draws us over to this fascinating grassland habitat.

It seems to be quite a popular place: with cyclists at the top of the lane, hikers following the South Downs Way, and runners setting off from the carpark. Passing through the reserve's access gate, we bear right along the path leading to the south facing hillside. Here, there are fine views over the Meon Valley farmland stretching away to the Solent and the Isle of Wight beyond.

Goldfinches twitter from a clump of hawthorns now clustered with crimson berries or haws. A kestrel perches on the skeletal frame of a lone tree before taking off to hover with head down, scanning for voles.

Although the path is close-cropped turf, rabbit-nibbled, the steep slopes on either side are a flowing mass of purples and mauves, largely marjoram and basil with knapweeds and scabious. The yellows of ragwort and wild parsnip also stand out. The deep blue domes of round-headed rampion are a further botanical delight.

With binoculars on close focus, we peer down at a large skipper feeding on marjoram. Resting with wings half open, the undersides show a greenish tint decorated with a pattern of pearly patches. This is a silver spotted skipper - a lover of warm sun-baked chalk downland, languishing here in one of its few remaining refuges. We meet another enthusiast on a similar quest. With butterfly badges pinned to his cap and notebook in hand, he's also on the trail of skippers and the downland blues.

Chalk Hill blues abound with their pale, milky blue wings. Farther on where the turf is short and the vetches grow, a walker stands, rapt, totally absorbed by the butterflies basking on the ground below. One of which, with wings outstretched of the brightest most brilliant blue, is an Adonis Blue – a local rarity.

Walking with Wildlife

The high downland bordering Woodmancott is well wooded with copses, coverts and plantations, merging into a summer skyline of sweeping broad-leaves plus the odd towering conifer. Together with Blackwood Forest over to the northwest and Micheldever Woods flowing away to the south, these woods form the Stratton Woodlands Landscape Character Area – a blend of forestry and farmland centred on the historic Stratton Park.

On a rather autumnal day in early August, we pass through East Stratton with its charming thatched cottages and head up the leafy lane that runs alongside the Park. At the top here is Rownest Wood, a compact Forestry Commission beechwood, known for its fine displays of bluebells in the spring. Two large blocks of sandstone guard the entrance, placed like Sarsen stones – as if markers or seating, or possibly mounting blocks for horse-riders. A splendid stand of teasels grow just within the wood, their bristle cone heads banded violet with tiny flowers. Bumblebees, their furry backs in damp tufts from early rain, cling on in torpor, rather cold and wet, all foraging temporarily suspended. Both white-tailed and tree bumblebees are present.

Strolling along the main ride, we enter a plantation of well spaced beech trunks with good sight lines below the pale green leaf canopy. Clumps of enchanter's nightshade with their delicate sprays of white flowers grow vigor-ously beside the path. Apparently in Saxon times, this intriguingly named plant was used to ward off spells cast by elves.

Deeper in the wood we find glow sticks of cuckoo pint or lords and ladies. The spikes of bright orange-red berries gleam in the low light of the woodland floor.

Following a line of horse's hoof prints, we emerge into a secluded farm lane brimming with colourful margins of trefoils. Walking up, we find an oak tree of great character contorted by age, looming from the hedgebank. Just beyond, there's an arable field with a wildflower meadow tucked into the top corner. A yellow blur of wild parsnip towers over the mauves and purples of field scabious, knapweeds and marjoram.

The final year of the training programme takes place in a different practice where the trainee (or Registrar as they are known) will use the knowledge and experience they have already have to gain the particular skills of a GP. We are very pleased to introduce our new cohort of trainee GPs, Dr Zane Koetser & Dr Ghayth Sandouka.

National shortage of blood test tubes:

There is currently an international shortage of blood bottles used for taking samples and clinicians working in GP practices, hospitals, community and mental health trusts and ambulance trusts have been asked to suspend non-essential blood tests.

Clinicians and managers in Hampshire and the Isle of Wight are working together to be more efficient. We will ensure we don't waste blood bottles and that we don't duplicate tests which have already been done. We are being thoughtful about which tests are ordered and prioritising those tests which will have an immediate impact on the diagnosis or treatment.

We are working hard to prioritise our blood tests and we appreciate your patience whilst we put in place systems to manage this difficulty safely.

We would like to reassure all our patients that this disruption in supply should not affect any essential blood tests and any tests that are delayed will be rescheduled as soon as possible. We are working closely with NHS England to follow their guidance. We will continue to provide you with updates regarding this and thank you for your support. If you are already booked for a blood test and do not hear from us, please attend as arranged.



Summary

Unsettled weather with showers and longer outbreaks of rain on most of the first nine days of August brought disappointing late summer conditions. Temperatures were mostly below normal for the time of year, which did not improve much later in the month. A couple of fine, sunny days followed but then the weather was generally dull and dry and brighter in the fourth week. Anti-cyclonic gloom descended at the end of the month where there was high pressure but thick, featureless cloud including on the summer bank holiday. The highest daytime temperature occurred on three occasions but at just 73°F was the lowest recorded here for August in over two decades. Overall, the month was cooler and drier than normal. The summer temperature was average and rainfall a third above the norm.



On the Farm—Julian Gibbons

We finally finished harvest on the 13th September having started on the 21st July. Although we finished the last field that actually yielded over budget it was the only field that did. It is fair to say that most of us in this area will be pleased to see the end of a difficult and bitterly disappointing harvest.

Only one crop came close to a budgeted yield, which was our Maris Otter winter barley. This might be because it is already inherently low yielding, however it actually looked much better then it performed.

Those of you who have watched the travails of Jeremy Clarkson on Clarkson's Farm, will be familiar with his battles with the weather and has given insight into why farmers are obsessed with the weather. It is the biggest driver for profitability and yet something over which we as individuals have little or no control.

Crops went into May looking remarkably disease free with all but the latest planted crops on heavy land looking full of potential. The wet May/June put pay to this with leaf diseases rampaging through them. The real killer blow however was the lack of sun. This really affected the counties from Hampshire to Kent and south of the M4 most of all. June, July and August were markedly duller then usual. Crops need this sunshine to make the starch to fill then grain. We finished up with poorly filled grains that have struggled to make the specific weights end users require. These poorly filled grains show up in poor yields. Our wheat yields were 20% or more down on budget, which is almost unheard of. Our milling wheat, which incurs the highest growing costs, is all in the feed bin. It's hagberg falling number, which is related to the enzyme activity that starts with germination, was on the floor even though the crop was harvested as soon as it was fit. Soft (or biscuit)wheat yields were disastrous with yields down nearly 40% on recent performance, with grain that will be discounted even as feed grain

Our winter oats although down in yield were of good quality, with a bright colour and good specific weight. They along with the winter barley came in to store dry unlike everything else that requires drying.

The spring barley was about 15% down in yield, but again it has all made malting which is a consolation.

To cap it all our grain drier that has been solidly reliable for the two seasons when we haven't needed to use it, broke when trying to fill it the first time and 7 weeks later is still waiting to be fixed.

Prices are very buoyant providing you haven't sold too much early. We budgeted for more grain then we could store, so sold 8 lorry loads as the alternative was paying for storage. However we now find ourselves loading cheap wheat and stores with 500 tonnes less grain in them.

Focus now moves onto planting next harvest's crops. The rape is in and up, seed is all ordered and so is the nitrogen fertiliser. The latter was for June delivery and we have received some of it, but with more to come and the factories shut due to high gas prices. This has seen nitrogen double in price.





Our speaker at our September meeting was Richard Murphy a former actuary, who explained that his talk'And now the good news'... was created in a response to a challenge from his mother-in-law, a local WI member. He set out to prove that despite the gloomy focus of daily news stories the world is indeed a much safer place today than it used to be. With a mass of facts and figures on hand he looked at the improvements in safe childbirth, reduction in diseases such as polio, malaria and measles and the development in medical research and medication. The development of technology, communications, and electricity has led to better connectivity and living conditions. Globally education is more widely available for both men and women. In the past 20 years improvements in commercial aircraft flight safety and road developments have meant a dramatic fall in the numbers of lives lost. Our daily lives have been made safer by the introduction of standards in food hygiene safety measures in toy production and clothing manufacture.

Today life expectancy in the UK is 70 +years. However, Richard pointed out that there are still challenges aheadclimate change and lifestyle choices to name but two areas to be tackled.

Our next meeting will be on Tuesday 5th October.

This will be a group meeting when we invite members from New Alresford, Bishops Sutton, Easton, Bramdean and Hinton Ampner and Wield to join us.

The speaker will be Judy Theobald, a journalist and radio presenter, formerly from Lincolnshire, who will give an amusing talk on the subject of 'Life and Other Problems'.

Please follow and adhere to these guidelines – the logistics of sorting clothing at the collection hubs is causing a challenge for volunteers, particularly as the volume items increases and the space lessens).

At this time the centres are only supporting those in temporary accommodation and are unable to accept general donations of other items no matter how well intended and well-meaning they are.

I've included two pictures this month: The picture of the 'yellow brick road' is not of The Watercress Way, but a section of the new cycle path from Worthy Down south towards to the Water Treatment site off the Andover road. It's a fantastic surface, and the section that is done is a credit to Hampshire County Council who have constructed it, but unfortunately, it doesn't reach all the way to Winchester yet. I am continuing to press for this route to be completed and I'd welcome your views.

I've been trying to get the Millennium path mended for several years, and a recent sighting (and photo) of ducks swimming in the puddles *on* the path seemed to chime with Hampshire County Council! I'm delighted that they have now agreed a budget for this work. It's a sensitive site ecologically, so the County Council will be working with the Winterbournes project and others to upgrade the path, hopefully before someone falls in the river. They have also agreed a budget to upgrade the path to Bishop's Sutton: hooray!

The County Council is preparing the budget for 2022-23 and it inevitably includes cuts. I'm pleased to see that the proposal to cut the school crossing patrols budget has gone: if we want children to walk to school, they must be helped to cross busy roads safely.

There are a number of Consultations this autumn: the proposal for the County Deal (similar to the Mayoral deal) will go out in early October. I'll give notice of others



as they arrive.

There's still no news of the New Hospital Consultation, but it was a huge pleasure to visit the Winchester Hospice on its open weekend. Huge thanks to every one of the fundraisers, NHS staff and Trustees. It will support residents as inpatients and whilst using their Hospice at Home service. Please continue to support *them* now the building is up and running- they need £1/2 million per year. You can donate online- or maybe run an event?
