



Walking with Wildlife, Robert Bryant

The fine weather of early April has made springtime walks in and around the Candovers even more delightful this year. The misty displays of blackthorn blossom seem to set the scene when lit up by the rising sun along the hedgerows and woodland edges.

On Mothering Sunday, as the clocks spring forward for British Summer Time, we return to Bugmore Hill at Godsfield for a morning stroll along to Wield Wood and back. Under remarkably blue skies and bright sunshine, we follow the Three Castles Path with its sweeping views southwards. The wayside banks at the field edge are pale yellow with splashes of primroses. Small white butterflies busily roam the grassy track, joined by a brimstone, sulphur yellow. Skylarks, quite invisible, sing from high over the fields, while chiff-chaffs, also quite elusive, chant from the bare treetops of Godsfield Copse.

The floor of the copse reveals a sunlit retreat for badgers amidst a dark green sea of bluebell leaves. The badgers have clearly been spring cleaning their setts, with heaps of old grassy bedding dragged out and dumped. While some early bluebells are in flower, their mass blooming will be eagerly anticipated later in the month. It's the petals of the sweet violet that provide the intense blues of the moment, plus the pale blue runners of ground-ivy. As we turn back to the path, a muntjac deer tiptoes away into the shadows.

There's a splendid wooden bench set into the bankside here, where we pause to scan the pastoral views over Armsworth before continuing along to Wield Wood. Bee-flies - fluffy brown mimics of bumblebees - hover in the sunshine probing the flowers of ground ivy for nectar. Hedgerow butterflies twist and glide along the sunny bramble banks: first a comma with its raggedy wings and later a peacock with its distinctive eyespots. A male orange-tip, freshly emerged, is a charming surprise.

At Wield Wood, a sprawl of starry white flowers basks in the spring sunshine lighting up the woodland floor. These are wood anemones or windflowers, indicators of ancient woodland, part of our countryside heritage.





Oh Deer!

Deer are frequently seen in the Candover Valley - of the six different species living in United Kingdom, three (fallow, roe and muntjac) are well established here. The abundance of food, maize in particular and shelter (woodland) has seen the population explode over the last 30 plus years.

The result is considerable damage to agricultural crops and woodland but also an increase in road traffic collisions.

REDUCE YOUR RISK - DRIVE DEER AWARE

Beware during peak danger periods

Highest-risk times are from sunset to midnight, and the hours shortly before and after sunrise.

Drive with caution

During peak danger periods or on roads where hitting a deer is a possibility, drive with caution and be on the lookout for deer near the road.

Seen one? Look for another

Be aware that more deer may well cross after the one you have noticed.

Use your lights

After dark, do use full-beam when there is no opposing traffic. BUT, when a deer or other animal is noted on the road, dim your headlights as animals startled by the beam may 'freeze' rather than leaving the road.

DON'T VEER FOR DEER

Don't over-swerve to avoid hitting a deer

If a collision with the animal seems inevitable, then hit it while maintaining full control of your car is the safest option.

The alternative of swerving into oncoming traffic or off of the road surface could be a lot worse. Motorcyclists are at particular risk when in direct collisions with animals.

Look out for traffic behind you

Only brake sharply and stop if there is no danger of being hit by following traffic, and use your hazard lights.

STAY SAFE AND REPORT THE INCIDENT

If you see an injured deer on the roadside?

- Pull over at a safe place
- Call the Police.

Giving as precise a location as you can. Use What3Words if you can.

They will deal with the situation and have access to specialists.

Do not try to assist or move the deer as this can put you in danger.

If you hit a deer while driving, your priorities, in this order, are:

- Keep yourself and anyone with you as safe as you can
- Park your car in the safest place with hazard lights on.
- Call an ambulance if human injuries warrant it
- Call the Police

Veteran Practice

As part of the health commitments of the Armed Forces Covenant, we have a dedicated Clinician, Dr. Hannah Harring, (you can read Hannah's statement here). Hannah, has specialist knowledge of military related health conditions and veteran specific health services. This is important in helping ex-forces to receive the best care and treatment. If you are ex-forces, to help ensure you are receiving the best possible care, please let your GP know.

A veteran is someone who has served in the British Armed Forces (Regular or Reserve) for at least one day, and includes any member of the Merchant Marine who has served in a war zone. This includes crew from convoys in World War 2 and more recently in the Falklands conflict and Gulf Wars.

About 18,000 service people move back into civilian life every year and whilst most of these individuals have similar levels of health to the general population, around 2,000 leave on medical grounds. The top reasons for medical discharge are for issues relating to back, knees, mental health, and hearing.

Being accredited means that a practice can better identify and treat veterans, refer them, where appropriate, to dedicated NHS services (such as the Veterans' Mental Health Transition, Intervention and Liaison service (TILS), the Veterans' Mental Health Complex Treatment Service (CTS) and the Veterans Trauma Network) and capture better epidemiological data to improve future health provision. It also means that the NHS is better able to meet the health commitments of the Armed Forces Covenant, whereby the Armed Forces community, including veterans, should face no disadvantage in accessing health services and should receive priority care for military attributable conditions, subject to clinical need.



Summary

There was the perfect start to the month with high pressure dominating which brought unbroken sunshine for the first four days and sharp overnight frosts. A week of milder weather followed before a persistent cold northerly breeze reduced temperatures to below average in the middle of the month. Then there was a return to milder conditions and the warmest day at 68°F at the Spring Equinox on the 20th. Light rain on the 21st ended a week of dry weather and was the start of a slightly less settled week. The month closed with some fine, sunny weather and rising daytime temperatures. Overall, March was milder than normal. There were only six days with measurable rainfall, and it was the driest March recorded here with only 11% of the long-term average figure.

Posy Rings and Mysterious Things.

Do you know why we wear wedding and engagement rings on the fourth finger of the left hand? Watch this space...

Many people choose to exchange rings when committing to a long term relationship. Ring trends, like all fashions, change over time. In medieval England, if you has sufficient means, a 'fede' ring, with two clasping hands, was a popular choice, or, perhaps your betrothed might even decide to splash out on a gold 'stirrup' ring (named for its shape) with a beautiful sapphire or garnet inset. However, some romantics chose to engrave a 'posy' (a brief sentiment or motto) on a ring with the common belief that, worn next to their partner's skin words had added poignancy and were more powerful.

Such 'posy' rings were generally (although not exclusively) gold and were all the vogue in both England and France from the late 14th to the early 18th century. They are very occasionally found by metal detectorists and it is one of these rings which I uncovered (to my utmost astonishment) during a visit to a local field in March.

Inscriptions on these rings are often hard to read, some being written in Norman French or Latin, some with phonetic spelling, but many follow a general pattern and there are some ever popular phrases. For instance,



'let love enduer' or 'acsept my love', but some had more mysterious messages, for instance, 'think on the sender', or 'I wish it better'. One can only speculate on the relationships in question. Perhaps clandestine, perhaps arranged marriages, such is the mystery of these poignant rings.

And so, one day several centuries ago someone either left or lost our local ring. It undoubtedly meant a great deal to them, marking an important and now forgotten moment in their life. Perhaps it simply slipped, unnoticed, from their finger, or, maybe it was cast off following a stormy argument marking the end of a long term relationship. It will always be a mystery, but, whatever the reason it remains an enormous privilege to be the first to hold such an object after its loss so long ago.

Sadly the message inside the ring also remains a mystery for now since, at some point, the ring was cut neatly in two, most likely so that each partner could wear one half. I am hopeful that, when it is looked at by experts within the treasure process the message will be deciphered and if so I will, of course, let you know.

Oh, and the fourth finger of the left hand was thought by the Egyptians to have a vein which leads straight to the heart. How romantic!

On the Farm— Julian Gibbons

I was, somewhat, amazed to see a farmer on the weather at the end of the 3rd week in March on local news complaining about the dry weather. There is a danger we are seen as "the boy who cried wolf".

March was the best run of spring weather we have had for a number of years. Traditional spring drilling always happens when the wind turns round to the east and we get cold, drying winds. All the spring crops were planted on time in March in generally good conditions. We did have to leave some spots that were still flooded at the beginning of March and towards the end of March we did have to conserve moisture to ensure seedbeds didn't dry out too much.

All the fertiliser has been applied to the barley and the first main dose of nitrogen has gone on the wheat in time for the mid-April rain to wash it in.

There is a bit of turning the spreader on and off to ensure we aren't fertilising bald areas, but most of the wheat has made a remarkable recovery. However, we are not going to be looking at a record breaking harvest.

Peas, as I write this in the middle of April. are emerging and the pigeons are just starting to change their focus of attention from struggling rapeseed crops to the peas. This has been the worst year for pigeons we have had for years, and we can but hope there is more natural food for them this winter to keep the pressure of the rapeseed. We belong to the grain storage co-operative Trinity Grain, that was formed from a merger of three co-ops. This year they have launched a climate smart malting barley grain pool linked to a maltster buyer. This hopefully for a bit of extra reporting will give us a bit of market reward for our nature friendly farming measures that we have adopted. These cover approximately 10% of the farmed area but also include how we grow the crop including shallow cultivations of no more than 10cm or direct drilling. Also, the use of organic manures, over winter cover cropping and livestock (if you have them).

All we have to plant now are our wild bird food plots and a herbal ley for Ben Robinson. WE need consistent moisture to get the grass to grow so just need to be a little patient

There was a bit of a panic just before the Chancellor of the Exchequer 's spring statement. There was a rumour going round that she was going to abolish red diesel. The use of the has been tightened up considerably in recent years. It is isn't exempt from excise duty, but it has a lower level. The loss of it would be a huge blow to the industry, which we would be unable to pass on to consumers. Having filled all our fuel tanks, the treasury put out a notice denying the claims. We have had so many blows in the last 7 months that we start to believe that any announcement is possible. We are hoping to have a Rogation service at All Saints', Bradley involving a tractor and trailer ride and a blessing of the crops on Sunday 11th May details. It should be lovely and the trailer is covered, just in case.
